All the ranges were flat and easy walking except for a few muddy ones the first three days. In fact, one lady from England shot all five days in a motorized wheelchair and won a gold medal. She was shooting a long bow, and there were many competitors in her class.

Those shooting in the Veteran Barebow Class were Rhonda Wall, David Hughes, Jerry Barr, Louis Travis, and myself from the USA; Colin Campbell of Scotland; Arno Kaczmarek of Germany; and Mike Lambert and Graham Fraser of Australia.

I had shot with Colin and Graham in two other World Archery Tournaments, one in Scotland and the other in Watkins Glen. It was great to revisit with them and to make the new friendships.

Rhonda Wall broke all the world records for Female Veteran Barebow. David Hughes broke records for Male Veteran Barebow classes. Arno Kaczmarek of Germany took second and Monty Heishman of the US took third. With the exception of David Hughes, the competition was pretty closely matched for five days.

We had the banquet and awards ceremony on Saturday afternoon and then we headed for home. We left Australia knowing that we had made a lot of new friends and had gotten to visit and renew friendships from previous tournaments.

Team USA won the gold medal; there were two non-sight shooters on that time. They were David Hughes and Larry Yien.

We had two longbow shooters who placed high in the standings: Renae Skubish with a fourth place finish and Larry Yien with a fifth place finish. Larry had his equipment stolen from his car at his home in California less than a week before he flew to Australia. Fifth is a great finish considering the new equipment and the stress of having had his car broken into. Just shows that you can't keep a good man down.
